Midweck Message

"Even youths shall faint and be weary, and young men shall fall exhausted; but they who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings like eagles; they shall run and not be weary; they shall walk and not faint."

(Isaiah 40:30,31 ESV)

Well, I honestly don't know how quickly that will happen nor do I know if life will get fully back to the way it was before this crisis began or if some things may be different. Whatever the case, I'm actually hoping and praying for a new revival in this world with people from all walks of life, turning from their rebellion against God and coming to faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

Now, I know this is difficult for us as God's people as we too are affected by this calamity in our world since we too are part of the human race. However, I also want you to understand that God has good things in mind for us as well as He is working to free us from many of the previously unknown idols in our lives. I was reading just this morning about one lady who was doing the "remain at home" thing only to have three of her appliances break all in the same day. That kind of thing can be quite frustrating to us, especially when we're still facing an even greater threat from this virus. However, the prophet Isaiah tells us that when we "wait upon the Lord" we'll be blessed as only God can bless us. The idea of waiting is that of personal expectation that God will come to our aid. It's very much like the child who has been promised something from Mom or Dad and then waits patiently for that promise to be fulfilled. Of course, sometimes Mom or Dad forget, or the day brings on something that gets in the way of fulfilling the promise. However, that's not what happens when we wait upon the Lord because nothing changes what God has promised nor does He change His plan and purpose for us as we look to Him.

You see, we wait patiently on God because He has always been faithful to His word and never waivers from one side to another. He is good and will always bring good out of every situation we might face, even this pandemic. Isaiah is telling us quite plainly that we can have absolute confidence in our God who loves us, who knows what we need, and will always take care of us. As I've often said, God's got this and us in the midst of this!

So, as we wait on God's purpose to be fulfilled, His glory to be exalted, we can do so in the strength that He gives us. God has promised that we'll be able to renew our strength as we continue on through this pandemic. So many times, when we're facing something that's very difficult, we often wonder if we'll ever be able to survive. We believe that we simply don't have the wherewithal to get through whatever crisis we happen to be facing and we often lose hope and become despairing of life. Well, the truth is that we can't—unless of course we look to the Lord who has promised us His strength so that we might carry on. We were never meant, as human beings, to live independent of the Lord but were created to be completely dependent on Him. Perhaps, that's another way in which God is working in the midst of His church through this pandemic as He helps us to see the idol of self-security.

However, when we genuinely look to the Lord, waiting with anticipation at what He's promised to us and what He's doing in this world and in our lives, we know that whatever He is doing will be for His glory and our good. In fact, Isaiah tells us that we will "mount up with wings like eagles", "run and not be weary", "walk and not faint." The idea is that God will cause will us to flourish in life as we strive to know, love, trust, and obey Him. You see, it's in our waiting on the Lord that we succeed as we continue on this current path on which God has called us to walk. We won't lose heart or hope because we know that God walks with us and our security is firmly established in who God is as well as all He's said.
